At the Setagaya Campus, Tokyo, we are working towards international student learning by providing specialized subjects that can be taken in English, enhancing supplementary Japanese-language classes, and offering programs and dormitory facilities in which they can experience Japanese society and culture firsthand.

The Ever-changing Nature of Showa Women's University

The Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology selected Showa Women's University for its 2012 Project for Promotion of Global Human Resource Development. Over the next four years, we will expand our Englishlanguage learning curriculum and study abroad program. The university will take on a more global nature that presents an even more accommodating learning environment for Japanese and international students alike.

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Faculty of Humanities and Culture

Learning about the language, culture, history, and literature of Japan and of various regions around the world develops a broad perspective and expert knowledge. Students selecting the Department of English Language and Communication are required to study abroad in Boston, and those selecting the Department of International Studies are required

to study abroad in Boston, Shanghai, or Seoul, depending on which language they choose.

International Student Support



Showa Women's University has various support systems in place to ensure that international students can focus on their studies, lead comfortable lives, and spread their wings in society.

Academic & Lifestyle Support Systems

• Center for International Exchange (CIE)

CIE assists international students with student life. Feel free to talk to a staff member about immigration procedures, life in Japan, and other issues.

• Class advisors

Every student belongs to a class or seminar. The class advisor of each class provides support related to courses, student life, career options, relationships with friends, and other issues.

• Japanese-language studies

Japanese-language classes for international students cover a wide range of material, from basic lessons in writing Japanese, reading newspaper articles, practicing pronunciation, to report writing and business Japanese. In Japanese-language skills classes, Japanese tutors support international students to help everyone improve their abilities.

• English-language studies

Our extensive English-language curriculum and study abroad programs develop the practical English skills that are required by global society. We aim to improve English-language skills by conducting placement tests, providing support through English-language learning advisors, offering specialized courses in English, and other such means.

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Writing Support Center

We can help with writing class reports, theses, resumes, job entry sheets, and other written work.

Tuition Assistance

- Tuition reduction for self-financed international students Up to 30 percent of the annual tuition can be waived.
- Scholarships

Several independent scholarships are available in addition to the Japan Student Services Organization Honors Scholarship, including the Hitomi Memorial Scholarship and the Honor Students Scholarship. About 60 percent of all international students are currently receiving some kind of scholarship.

Auditor System

There is an auditor system in place for those wishing to enroll in faculties and graduate schools at Showa Women's University. There are half-year and full-year terms. If you require preparation time before taking the entrance exam, please take advantage of this system.

International Exchange



Showa Women's University has currently concluded exchange agreements with ten universities in eight countries.

Short-Term Programs

These short-term programs for international students make use of the summer break and other holidays. Even beginning learners of the Japanese language can participate. The programs offer an opportunity to experience Japan first-hand through Japanese cultural activities, field trips, and English-language lectures on Japan. At the end of the programs there are multicultural collaboration projects in which international students and Showa Women's University students engage in collaborative learning.

On-Campus International Student Exchange Parties

International student exchange parties are held every year in January, April, and October. Many international students, Japanese students, and members of the faculty attend these parties, which also serve as welcome parties for new students and farewell parties for students that are leaving. International students can share information with each other on classes and living in Japan and talk with senior students and teachers about studying and finding employment, so there are always a lot of international students in attendance. The Showa Boston Institute for Language and Culture is the overseas campus of Showa Women's University. This campus was established in Boston, one of the world's foremost university towns, ahead of those of other universities in Japan. As a hub for English-language education and international exchange, the Showa Boston Institute follows an English-language curriculum in collaboration with the Setagaya Campus, Tokyo.

Study abroad programs are a requirement of the Department of English Language and Communication, the Department of International Studies, and the Department of Business Design even if you are an international student. There is also a 15-week spring/autumn Boston program (one semester), Boston summer session (one month), and Boston Japanese culture program (two weeks) for students of other departments, so every student has the opportunity to study at the Showa Boston Institute. In addition to English-language skills, you can learn about Japan from an American perspective through experiences with American cultural activities and American society. Studying abroad in Boston can also be used as a step to pursue study abroad programs at various universities around the world.

University Admissions



Information on the General Entrance Examination for Self-financed International Students

Every step of the entrance examination from the application to the examination itself is conducted in Japan, and the exam is only available in Japanese. Applicants must have taken the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) or passed at least the N2 level of the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test.

Selection Method

Applicants will be judged according to an overall assessment of their application documents and their performance on the written examination and interview.



There are numerous women's universities in Japan. Many of them are educational institutions with histories and traditions that from the time of their founding have sought to provide women with a specialized education. The predecessor of Showa Women's University, the Japan Women's Institute, was founded in 1920. Amid a post–World War I environment in which many people were mired in adversity, the founder's desire was to provide educational nurturing to women so that they would not lose their way, and instead become women who would use their strengths for the betterment of the world. Showa Women's University has consistently upheld this tradition, and will soon celebrate its 100th anniversary.

When someone hears of a women-only university, they may be tempted to think that it is a university focused on turning out good, dutiful wives and wise mothers. In reality, however, female students run all of the student organizations, so compared to co-educational universities there are actually more opportunities for women to be involved, and they are able to develop the leadership and organizational skills required in society. While capitalizing on women's distinctive characteristics and maintaining traditions, the goal of education at this university is cultivating talented people with the flexibility to respond sensitively to emerging trends.

Campus Location

Showa Women's University is situated in the heart of Tokyo, the capital of Japan. It is conveniently located a seven-minute walk away from Sangenjaya Station, and just two stops (about five minutes) from Shibuya, a popular gathering place for young people.

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
